MISSION MEANS COOPERATION

FROM THE HOLY TRINITY
TO MY NEIGHBOR NEXT-DOOR

MISSION AND COOPERATION WITHIN THE HOLY TRINITY

Mission means Cooperation: this daring statement has its foundation in the Trinity itself. As we contemplate the overwhelming Merciful Trinity by Sr. Caritas Muller OP, we notice simultaneously a double truth. The first one tells us about Missio Dei, the threefold Mission of Triune God: The Father, in the circle on the right, bends over the man, tenderly holding him, supporting him and kissing him (Gen 2:7). The Son, in the circle on the left, gently touches his feet, tending his wounds. The image reminds us of the Good Samaritan (Lk 10:30-35) and the washing of feet at the Last Supper (Jn 13:3-16). The Holy Spirit, in the middle, looks down on the man as if beckoning him to wake up and

get up. The image reminds us of the Epiphany of the Spirit in the form of tongues of fire at Pentecost and in the form of a dove at Jesus' baptism. The second truth





concerns the cooperation: just as the three Divine Person are united and interwoven in their substance, they always work together in favor of the whole humankind. There is not a single moment from this Divine Mission where One Person might work without the cooperation of the Two Others. Therefore, we can conclude this introduction by quoting the

Gospel: "What God united, man should not separate": this regards also Mission and Cooperation of the Church!

MISSION AND COOPERATION DURING THE LITURGY

If this is true for the Missio Dei, we shouldn't and couldn't do otherwise, neither in the Church nor in the concrete relationship with the people we are sent to, since we don't have other mission, but His Mission! In this spirit, the Second Vatican Council employed only collective nouns to express both the identity and the mission of the Church: "Assembly of those called by God", "People of God", "Kingdom of God", "Body

of Christ", "Temple of the Holy Spirit", "Community of believers". Empowered by this awareness, we delve within the next part of this presentation into the four determinant parts of the Holy Mass, where the Mission and Cooperation are intrinsically articulated together: 1. The Introductory Rite with the joint Confession of the sins; 2. The Liturgy of the Word, where the People of God listen together the Word of God; 3. The Eucharistic Table, where the people of God is washed and nourished together and 4. The Sending, where the God's People is sent on Mission.

- 1. The Gathering and the Penitentiary Moment: in the first part of the Mass, the cooperation is enabled first of all by the constitution itself the Liturgical Assembly and then by the common prayer of Confiteor where we ask for repentance and mediation. The striking fact is that Mission emerges so early as in the beginning of the Holy Eucharist, as each faithful is requested personally to pray for the others: "therefore I ask blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sister, to pray for me to the Lord our God".
- 2. Passing to the second part of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Word, we discover again how mission and cooperation are enacted and shared among the priest and the members of

the Liturgical Assembly. Indeed, just as the content of the Good News is not limited





to the Gospel's Proclamation, in the same way there are different persons from the Assembly who convert themselves in Missionaries and Cooperators of spreading the Word of God. Thus, the Collect, the Readings, the Creed, the Hymns and songs, and foremost the Eucharistic Prayers form altogether ways of telling the Redeeming Story of God's love, which need different actors within the Holy Liturgical Drama.

As we proceed further to the third part of the Mass, from the Offertory to the Communion, Mission and Cooperation are impossible to be separated. The priest, before acting in Persona Christi both in the "sacrament of the towel" by washing feet and then by feeding the People of God with the Eucharist, he asks first the intercessory prayer of the faithful and then washes his hands from the Altar servants. We can actually highlight four different missionary dimensions during this Liturgical moment, where the cooperation of all is required: the mission of the acceptance accomplished by obeying the Words of the Preface: "Take and receive, Take and drink"; the mission of witnessing the Mystery of Faith: "We proclaim your death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again"; the mission of nurturing the people of God; and the mission of keeping alive those who received the Holy Sacrament, as we pray

after Communion.

4. Finally, we find the most impressive and

the clearest expression of the relationship between Mission and Cooperation at the end of the Mass! In fact, the word itself "Missa" takes its roots from "Missio". And the final words of Dismissal: "Go in Peace" express in Latin: Ite Missa est, both our sending and our being sent together, not alone, each one to his or her home. Actually, these words mirror the Great Commission from Mt 28, 18-20: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father

and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age"..

THE AMBASSADORS: 2Corinthians 5:20 refers to the church as Christ's

ambassadors, through whom God makes his appeal for the world to be reconciled to him. Cooperation means here to build bridges between the Kingdom of God and the culture you are living in.

THE ILLUMINATORS: God sends his people into every corner of the earth to shine His light. It does not matter how deep the darkness is in a given place, Christians are still called to shine forth God's light because, as Psalm 24:1 says, "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, / the world, and all who live in it " Cooperation

means here Co-existence: to be present in the world, with the people we are sent to.

THE TRANSLATORS: Christians are to live as translators by contextualizing the gospel

and the church. Contextualization adapting means the gospel and the church so that they make sense to the local context. But without losing any of the fundamental, nonnegotiable elements of either Gospel or Church! Cooperation means here to convey the Christian message

in an understandable, yet uncompromised way to its receivers!

THE STORYTELLERS: Storytelling may not seem like a missional practice, but it is in fact crucial to faithfully living out our missionary

And, "once the Mass of the Altar has ended, starts the Mass of the Neighbor" (Blessed Vladimir Ghika): here again we called to uncover how the

Christian Mission and Cooperation are mingling together in the daily life. Since we contemplate the Acts of the Apostles, we discover six ways through which the first missionaries were unfolding their spreading of the Good News.







calling. Indeed, it would be impossible for people to share common ways of life if they did not also share some sort of common narrative, some kind of social story to shape the way they view life, themselves, their relationships to one another and to the world. Cooperation means here to act like Jesus with the disciples in Emmaus: Dialogue

involves practicing conversation, "give and take" which involves listening and speaking, learning and proclaiming.

THE FOREIGNERS: The church is not to feel at home in this world or to strive to be a culturally elite establishment. Instead, the church is to understand that it belongs to God and his kingdom, and is therefore not of this world. This understanding means that the life of the church is one of pilgrimage and journey, of being exiles and strangers, of being foreigners in a land that is not their own. Cooperation means here to be and act like Paul in Athens.

THE ENHANCERS: Bringing Out the Beautiful. Jesus declared to his followers that they were the "salt of the earth". As the salt of the earth the church enhances the world around it, bringing out more vibrancy in what is beautiful and preserving what is good. It also keeps the ugly and the evil at bay. The role of the enhancer is simple: make the good even better and minimalize the bad. Cooperation means here to highlight the Good from the local culture, without compromising with its corrupted parts.

INAUGURAL CELEBRATION OF THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF MISSIONARY CHILDHOOD IN BURUNDI



In Burundi, the Missionary Childhood saw the light of day on January 6, 1976 in the current Archdiocese of Bujumbura, on the initiative of His Excellency Monsignor Michel Ntuyahaga, bishop of the Archdiocese at the time.

After 10 years, this initiative spread to all the dioceses of Burundi in the following succession: Diocese of Bujumbura in 1975; Diocese of Bubanza in 1975; Diocese of Muyinga in 1980; Diocese of Bururi in 1990, Archdiocese of Gitega in 1994, Diocese of Rutana in 1999, Diocese of Ngozi in 2003.



THE STAR SINGERS

In the course of this activity, Missionary Childhood saw the birth of an apostolate group called the Star Singers. This group animates families by bringing them the joy of Christmas and asking for donations for the Society.

The period of greatest activity is around Epiphany, when the Day of the Holy Childhood is celebrated. In this period, the children of the Missionary Childhood groups, accompanied by their animators, perform the activity of the Star Singers. Like the Magi who came from the East to adore the Child Jesus, guided by the star, they go from one hearth to another announcing the Glad Tidings of the Saviour's birth. The activity takes place in all parishes and the number of children taking part is growing day by day.

Similarly, the number of animators is increasing, which facilitates the missionary catechesis of children in the various areas. Their apostolate is appreciated by adult Christians and arouses in them a missionary commitment.

At this year's Epiphany, Missionary Childhood celebrated the opening of the 50th anniversary Jubilee (Golden Jubilee), which will end on the eve of Epiphany 2025, i.e. Saturday, January 4, 2025. To date, there are Missionary Childhood groups in all the parishes of the Church of Burundi, led by the animators of this Society, who are priests, men and women religious, catechists or lay Christians involved in the Christian and missionary education of children.



BLESSING OF THE MONUMENT FOR THE JUBILEE OF MISSIONARY CHILDHOOD IN BURUNDI

Saturday 6 January, full of ceremonies, ended in the evening in the Parish of St Michael, the first parish where the Missionary Childhood Society in Burundi was founded, with the blessing of a double monument by the Archbishop of Bujumbura. On one side, the monument was dedicated to the 50th anniversary of the founding of Missionary Childhood in Burundi, on the other side another monument commemorated 100 years since the ordination of the first Burundian priests, a period sufficient for a mature Church.

The evening ended with a prayer vigil in which the Catholic bishops of Burundi, the priests, the Missionary Children and their animators, in adoration of the Holy Sacrament, entrusted themselves to Jesus.

EUCHARISTIC CELEBRATION AT THE OPENING OF THE JUBILEE OF THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF MISSIONARY CHILDHOOD IN BURUNDI

On Sunday, January 7, 2024, during the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, the Bishops members of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Burundi solemnly opened the Jubilee of 50

years of existence of Missionary Childhood in Burundi. The Mass brought together on Mount Sion Gikungu in the municipality of Bujumbura, Archdiocese of Bujumbura, missionary children from all the dioceses of the country, under the theme "All baptized children are sent by Christ to Burundi and the whole world".

In the opening message of this Jubilee, Monsignor Bonaventure Nahimana invited the children, parents, animators and chaplains to place pastoral emphasis on the following points: "Provide all children with a Bible appropriate to their level; organize training courses, retreats and pilgrimages for Missionary Children, their animators and chaplains; organize concerts and missionary celebrations for children based on biblical knowledge; sensitize children to love school and works of solidarity and development; organize a day dedicated to prayer for children and raising awareness of the need to protect them from various forms of abuse".





TESTIMONY OF A MISSIONARY CHILD

We thank God who inspired Bishop Michel Ntuyahaga to launch Missionary Childhood activities in Burundi. We also thank the Catholic Church in Burundi that always supports us and the National Direction of the Pontifical Mission Societies that sends us material for missionary animation and organizes the training courses, pilgrimages, retreats, recreational moments during missionary concerts and other initiatives.

We are happy when exchange visits are organized between children from different parishes to share their experiences, as well as the monthly Masses for Missionary Children, which help us meet the Lord and collect aid for the poorest children.

DIGI SEKAMI TEENS SCHOOL OF MISSION







Digi SEKAMI

DIGI SEKAMI is an abbreviation of digital sekami (the Pontifical Society of Holy Childhood in digital), which is a tutorial for assisting the faith of missionary children in a digital Android application. This digital application was created in 2021 and is intended for family-based missionary children. This application can be downloaded on Android phones through the play store under the name Apps Digi Sekami. With this app, spread throughout Indonesia, the parents are assisted and guided to accompany their young missionary children. In 2023, the National Office of PMS completed the content of the Digi Sekami application for the year of Liturgy A.





TEENS SCHOOL OF MISSION

As a project of particular interest, the national office holds "Teens School of Mission" program. Teens School of Mission (TSOM) is a special missionary education and formation program for teenagers or young people. It was held for one year (January 2023 – January 2024) as a third batch.

TSOM's vision is that Catholic teens live in Christ smartly, strongly, joyfully and missionary. TSOM's directions are:



- educating teens who have been baptized Catholic intensively
 - **2.** instilling Christian values in adolescents as a form of life in Christ
- **3.** fostering Christian joy in adolescents
- training creative skills and intellectual, emotional, and spiritual and social intelligence
- guiding adolescents to faith in Christ firmly in the habit of reflection and prayer
 - forming adolescents who are ready to proclaim the Gospel through prayer, charity, sacrifice and witness of daily life

Teens School of Mission (TSOM) was held as a follow-up to the formation of missionary children from the national jamboree 2018. Until 2023, three batches have been held, namely TSOM 2019 as batch I, TSOM 2020-2022 as batch II, and TSOM 2023 as batch III. TSOM batch III was attended by missionary teenagers from 14 dioceses, namely Archdiocese of Medan, Archdiocese of Palembang, Archdiocese of Makassar, Archdiocese of Semarang, Diocese of Surabaya, Diocese of Bandung, Diocese of Pangkalpinang, Diocese of Padang, Diocese of Manado, Diocese of Tanjung Selor, Diocese of Palangka Raya, Diocese of Jayapura, Diocese of Amboina, and Diocese of Sintang. TSOM program was held on January 2023 – January 2024 at each diocese and on some occasions nationally together.



TANZANIA ARCHDIOCESE OF MWANZA



The Archdiocese of Mwanza is blessed with many children especially in the rural areas most of whom, unfortunately, do not know how to read and write simply because their parents did not attend any school. We reach such children and find ways to help them go to school and to Church.

In their great numbers, children in the Archdiocese of Mwanza frequent catechism classes and like coming together in matters of Faith and social activities like sports and games, pilgrimages. We see the future of the church in our children. We want to hold them together for the good of the Church.

The People of God in Mwanza contribute money to cater for PMS activities in the Archdiocese and we collect money from them and we send it to NDPMS every year.

On the 8th of January we have Christmas for Children where the Archbishop prays together with Children in Mwanza. There will be various seminars and Catechism classes to Children and Their guardians. Children play together and make friendship with other fellow children.

We now have a group of experts who deliver seminars to children is pre & primary schools and in secondary schools on child protection and on how to report the different abuse cases to respective authorities. This is an ongoing activity

in the Archidiocese of Mwanza.

Further, in 2023, we have organized two congresses at Diocesan level, one at Sumve parish and one at Kawekamo Shrine). In all congresses we edify our children on prayer, good morals and faith.

THE SEMINAR FOR CHILDREN AND THE NATIONAL CONGRESS

Thanks to the Ordinary Subsidy of the Pontifical Society of Missionary Childhood we could organize a seminar for children and a Missionary Childhood

National Congress, which was held in Kondoa Parish. The seminar for children was held at Magu Parish and children came from different parishes.

For the diocesan seminar for Children we established a four people team to deliver various lessons: a priest, a nun, a parent and a lay catechist.

Children were taught to be aware of the possible child abuse, how to refuse, how to report and help each other to report to respective authority on various abuses.

There was dissemination of the diocesan child protection and safeguarding policy together with that of the Episcopal Conference of the Church in Tanzania.

The Congress in Kondoa awakened Faith in Children belonging to the Archdiocese of Mwanza, they prayed together, enjoyed lessons together, played together.

The Children appreciated the

various efforts of the Church in caring for their spiritual, physical, psychological and emotional wellbeing. They are as well ready to collaborate with parents and pastors of souls in Evangelization as missionaries to fellow less fortunate children in their areas and schools.

UZBEKISTAN

APOSTOLIC ADMINISTRATION



The Apostolic Administration of Uzbekistan is a jurisdiction of the Catholic Church that extends across the entire territory of Uzbekistan in Central Asia. The administrative center of this jurisdiction is the capital, Tashkent, where the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart is located.

The territory is divided into five parishes: the Sacred Heart Cathedral in Tashkent, St. Andrew's Church in Bukhara, St. Mary's Church in Ferghana, St. John the Baptist Church in Samarkand, and Our Lady, Mother of Mercy Church in Urgench. In 2020, there were 3,098 baptized Catholics out of a total population of 31,867,000.

Our parish prioritizes working with children, especially focusing on their formation and education in faith and Christian values. We invite children to spend the day at the parish, where we strive to create a healthy and joyful environment. This also provides parents with peace of mind, knowing their children are in a safe place.

In predominantly Muslim countries, evangelization

is a gradual process that encounters challenges. The local mindset is often unfamiliar with certain Christian principles, such as respect for other religions and specific human values. Therefore, a significant part of our work involves teaching children both human values and Christian principles. We engage in these conversations when children visit the parish oratory, allowing us



to connect with them directly.

THE ORATORY

Over the past months, we have made significant progress in strengthening our work with the children who attend our oratory. They join us regularly on three specific days: Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. These oratory days have allowed us to establish closer connections with the children, providing an ideal setting for instilling values through personal conversations, catechism, and communal prayer.

A crucial aspect of these gatherings is the provision of snacks or dinners for the children. Many of them come from impoverished backgrounds and lack adequate nutrition at home. Our commitment is to offer nourishing meals.

WE PICK UP CHILDREN FROM THEIR HOMES

The consistency of the children's participation in our parish activities owes much to our dedicated priests, who pick up the children from their homes using the parish vehicle. These children reside in different parts of the city, and their parents often face challenges in bringing them due to limited public transportation coverage. After school, we collect them from their homes, and after a nourishing dinner, we take them back to their houses.

GAMES, RETREATS, GATHERINGS

During oratory sessions, we recognize the children's

need for play and enjoyment so we spend some time playing games—often educational, sportsrelated, board games, or creative crafts.

We have also organized some retreats for children and gatherings for altar servers. Children look forward to these events because they blend catechetical games with catechism classes, sports, intellectual competitions, and Bible knowledge contests. Some of these enriching activities take place in the mountains, allowing the children to connect with nature, which also helps to develop virtues. All of this has become possible thanks to your material support. We are very grateful and remain steadfast in our prayers—for you, your work, and all the children in the world.

MYANMAR DIOCESE OF HAKHA



The Diocese, together with the country is experimenting a tragic and deeply challenging time. The children are among the most vulnerable population affected by the conflict. Our children are facing various hardships, including:

- Displacement, which results in loss of stability, access to education and exposure to harsh living conditions.
- They are exposed to violence, both directly and indirectly. Many children are deprived of the opportunity for education due to lack of resources, schools being closed or destroyed.
- Due to war torn environment the children are traumatized in both physical and mental life



THE DAY OF THE HOLY CHILDHOOD

There is monthly Eucharistic Celebration for the children. Before the Holy Mass, they say their morning prayer and the Rosary together for those children who are in great difficulty because of war, famine and ill health and for peace around the world. After the Holy Mass, they would spend the day together by learning Catechism, reciting some Bible verses by heart, singing hymns and Gospel songs, dancing and playing social games. They would perform all these items group by group in unison: they would have lunch together in the afternoon. The children usually help with the necessary of the parish. Spending one day together as God's children once a month is a wonderful time for them.

BURKINA FASO

DIOCESE OF NOUNA







The Diocese of Nouna has a predominantly young population, with children comprising a significant portion. In recent months, concerns about insecurity have heightened uncertainties regarding the future and development of this youthful and still innocent segment of society.

Insecurity has caused a massive migration of rural populations towards urban areas. There is a natural divide between urban and rural populations, exacerbated by the fact that many of these children are aware they live in someone else's home. Therefore, fostering interactions among children, particularly through activities like sports, is crucial to bridging this divide and promoting principles of mutual support.

The children's movements, "Brave Hearts" and "Valiant Souls" (CV-AV), as well as the children's choir (Samuel Group), serve as a means of transmitting moral, human, and spiritual values to Burkinabé society. For this reason, like other dioceses in the Burkina-Niger Episcopal Conference, the Diocese of Nouna has focused its pastoral work on children's education.

In this challenging situation, exacerbated by the lack of security in Burkina Faso and even more so in the province of Kossi, of which Nouna is the capital, the full development of children is under threat. Between March and July 2023, we witnessed a massive movement of people from rural to urban areas, resulting in many children being unable to access local schools due to

overcrowding. Consequently, we are grappling with incivility and organized crime. Therefore, our pastoral approach must emphasize non-violence, culture, and social cohesion. We must convey a message of peace and tolerance to the youngest among us, as they are a cornerstone of social unity.



BIBLICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN

In the challenging security context, the Diocese of Nouna has embraced the following pastoral theme: "Remain faithful to your faith in Jesus Christ and be a builder of peace". Indeed, our community has witnessed horrifying and tragic scenes, prompting many to seek refuge in safer places. In the face of this tragedy, they no longer know which saint to turn to. There's a real risk of turning to alternatives outside their Christian faith. Amidst these tribulations, children are not left behind. Providing them with a strong foundation in faith will help them navigate these challenging times in their



spiritual journey. As St. Jerome once said, to ignore the Scriptures is to ignore Jesus Christ. Therefore, we aim to help children better understand the person of Jesus Christ through the Sacred Scriptures.

FRATERNIZATION DAY WITH CHILDREN FROM INTERNALLY DISPLACED GROUPS (INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE - IDP)

Parishes are already familiar with Children's Christmas, a day after the celebration of the Nativity when communities place special emphasis on children through fraternal sharing. Like the early communities, resources are pooled and redistributed based on everyone's needs. Due to the security situation, the number of children in shelter areas has significantly increased. That is why we are organizing a campaign called 'One child, one full meal for Christmas.' This meal is complemented by gifts to encourage efforts in building daycare centers and organizing group activities for the children.

Thanks to the aid received, we could provide school kits (notebooks, pens, books, backpacks) to 460 children. The actions of unidentified armed individuals have had



a profound impact on the students. Some were repeatedly threatened on their way to school, while others witnessed their school supplies destroyed or set on fire by these very people. Many of the children who endured these abuses were on the brink of despair, not knowing where to find what they needed for their education. This assistance was a huge relief for the children, as well as for the parents who were left speechless and the teachers who watched helplessly as their classrooms emptied day after day.





THE COMMERCIAL

The subsidy we received allowed us to create a commercial that aired throughout the year. The commercial, featuring children, was based on one of the principles of the Brave Hearts and Valiant Souls movement (CV/AV: a good child, a good sibling, and a good companion). The ad encouraged cautious openness towards others and aimed to restore hope to children far from their homeland. Additionally, we produced four programs in four different languages: French, Dioula, Bwamu, and Mooré, the main languages spoken in the Diocese. Through these broadcasts, the participating children could understand the mission of the diocesan radio, which is to be "the voice of the voiceless."

My name is Coulibaly Félicien and I'm in fifth grade. In our village, the school is a bit out in the bush, about 2 km away. One evening, on our way home, some armed men stopped us. They told us to tear up our notebooks, then they burned our backpacks and the school as well. They also warned us not to come back to school anymore. My parents took me to Djibasso to stay with an uncle. I wanted to keep going to school, but I had nothing left. When we went to the parish, they helped my parents send me back to school. Thanks to the support from The Missionary Childhood Association, could continue my education. My parents were overjoyed. I have learned that we should think of those in difficult situations. May God bless all the benefactors and bring peace back to the world.

My name is Drabo Raoul. I am 11 years old and in fifth grade at Stade School in Nouna. Every day, I used to make fun of my classmate Baye Fabrice because he was new in town. I didn't know his family had been forced out





of their village. He felt terrible and stopped playing soccer with us. But one day, while I was teasing him again, Naty Hermélène, another classmate, told me she heard on Radio Kantigiya that we all have the same opportunities and we should be kind to others. From that day on, Baye Fabrice became my best friend at school.

KENYA ARCHDIOCESE OF MOMBASA



The Catholic Archdiocese of Mombasa is situated in the coastal province of Kenya. It is a metropolitan with Garissa and Malindi dioceses as it covers an area of 38,000sq kilometres with a population of approximately 3.5 million people and majority of Catholic are from upcountry.

The Archdiocese covers four counties that is Taita Taveta, Kwale, Kilifi, and

Mombasa, we have 12 deaneries and 61 parishes.

Mission statement of the Catholic Archdiocese of Mombasa is "With our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ our guide and inspiration, we strive to create a just, loving and caring society that recognizes the dignity of the human person from the moment of conception to natural death". Our motto in Archdiocese is: That all may be one (JN 17:18 -21), which all Christians and our PMC children are practicing as they live their own motto: Children Helping Children.

The PMS office each year have its activity calendar that goes to each deanery of which

we have some children who are in arid and semi-arid areas of our Archdiocese and others from very poor and vulnerable families to get two meals is very hard. Our PMC children are in all these deaneries and very active despite the challenges they come across. The animators -assist the parish Priest to reach out where the children are especially those who are from unstable families and in schools. Most of the families who are living

in informal settlements are in a very hardcore state and so our PMS office has a feeding and education program because of the children who are suffering and abused. We are grateful to God despite the challenges they are facing they are able to cope up with them. Our Archbishop, Priest and religious men and women who are working in our Archdiocese are very supportive to our PMS office and our national director and

coordinator help us so much.

This year is a great year for our children because

despite of diversity of our Archdiocese the children celebrated 180 years of foundation of the society by Bishop Charles de Forbin-Janson in a very big number from all deaneries and being escorted by their priest and animators. All parishes where these children came from contributed for their feeding and the parents provided for their means of transport and accommodations because some couldn't make to and back.

The vast Diocese of Bangassou spans an area of 134,000 square kilometers, almost half the size of Italy. Despite its expanse, the diocese comprises only 13 parishes, served by 29 priests and a few religious men and women. Among the 603,000 residents, approximately 85,000 (14%) are Roman Catholic Christians.

The eastern part of the Diocese is plagued by ruthless mercenaries, who have inflicted immense suffering upon the civilian population and children. These vulnerable individuals live under constant pressure in a war-torn environment. We especially celebrated Missionary Childhood Day, organizing a wonderful program for children and teenagers—Muslims, Protestants, and Catholics. With their parents' approval, they spent three days together at the Catholic mission. These days were filled with tolerance and prayer, uniting more than a thousand children.

Annually, on Epiphany Day, the diocese holds

a collection for the Missionary Childhood Association. We conduct awareness meetings with children, engage in activities, share community prayers, recite the missionary rosary, and embark on pilgrimages to the Grotto of the Madonna, where we pray the rosary.

We emphasized the importance of the Missionary Childhood collection in all parishes, alongside other significant initiatives such as World Mission Sunday and support for our Indigenous clergy.

ST. ANDREW'S PARISH OF BAKOUMA

The situation of the children in Bakouma Saint Andrew's Parish is located in the subprefecture of Bakouma, near the town of Nzacko, an area plagued by high insecurity due to the presence of rebels. Bakouma has been repeatedly attacked by these rebels, causing many villagers to flee their homes, settlements around chapels, and even Nzacko, to the center of Bakouma. Currently, there are more than two displaced persons camps here. Some of our chapels have been closed and looted. These circumstances paint a vivid picture of the children's situation in this area: numerous war orphans, displaced children. some still traumatized and out of school, and others lacking even the most basic necessities for their wellbeing. We see displaced, orphaned, malnourished, lost, and traumatized children.

Measures and Support Initiatives

The Parish, through the Diocese, has established a primary and a secondary school to support these children. These schools provide an ideal environment for education and human value formation. Children come to school every day in their uniforms and stay until noon.

At the parish level, we have revitalized several groups to engage the children. Twice a week, the members of ACE (Aita Kwe) meet in the afternoon with their leaders. They learn to set up camp, dance,

and read the Word of God. Similarly, altar servers, scouts, and guides have their meeting days to read their statutes, organize weekly apostolates, and participate in charity days.

Catechism classes are held every afternoon, attracting many children who learn about themselves and Jesus, guided by catechists and priests.

In addition, at the beginning and end of the pastoral year, we organize two-day excursions. These outings are moments of bonding and, more importantly, serve as Bible camps. The priest responsible for the children's movement invites all the children from the parish and surrounding settlements to a chapel, where they learn about God and how to live as Christians.

Together with other laypeople, the priests organize games and competitions involving reciting Bible verses and performing biblical stories. The children, individually or by parish, contribute money or goods, which are then pooled together.

Finally, every year, the Epiphany celebrations are led by the children. They prepare the songs and the mass. To achieve this, we organize two days of training and teaching on the "Magi" and the "Prophets." The children recite Bible verses to familiarize themselves with the Word of God. The themes of these meetings include The Role of the Child in the Parish or the Settlement Around the Chapel, and the Child Jesus.



PARISH OF THE HOLY SPIRIT IN BEMA

The Situation of Children in Bema

The Parish of the Holy Spirit in Bema is located near the border with the Democratic Republic of the Congo. This location results in a diverse population that includes both Central Africans and Congolese, which influences the local lifestyle and behavior. The community is home to over 2,000 children, but many do not attend school. Bema also has a large monthly market that attracts traders from various backgrounds.

The town is primarily a fishing community because of its proximity to the river. This situation poses several challenges for the children in Bema. First. children are often split between parents on either side of the river, which disrupts their education. Parents frequently involve their children in fishing from a young age, preventing them from attending school regularly. Second, Bema has become a hub for "revivalist churches" from the Congo. Even baptized children are innocently taken by their parents to these places of worship instead of the parish. Lastly, as a border town, Bema struggles with a crisis of moral and religious values. Children, especially girls, are at risk of sexual predators, while boys are often engaged in trading or fishing from morning until night.

Support and Guidance Measures response to these challenges, the Diocese of Bangassou opened a Catholic Associated School (ECAC) in the center of Bema, which now serves over 325 children. Managed by the parish priest, the school provides education and nurturing for the children. Additionally, our Catholic Action movements, including ACE, altar servers, scouts and guides, and dancers, help welcome these children and provide them with spiritual and biblical education, especially during catechism meetings. Twice a week, children come to the church according to their level to learn about the history of salvation from our catechists. The ACE children gather twice a week to sing, read, share the Word of God, and dance. Altar servers also meet weekly to learn more about their roles. sing, and share the Gospel; they are in the parish or chapels daily and learn catechism from the catechists. We also organize retreats and outings for children aged 5 to 12. These two-day excursions to chapels around Bangassou allow them to experience Church life, fostering a sense of faith and community.

We organize these trips and retreats outside the town, in one of our settlements around the chapels, to invite all the children from the parish chapels. These events occur at the start of each important liturgical season, such as Advent, Lent, and especially in the two days leading up to the

Epiphany celebration. The themes we explore with the children include: "The Call of Samuel," "Being Missionary Children," and "Good Company or Influences."

These gatherings are always overseen by a layperson and are organized with everyone's contribution and the help of the Missionary Childhood Association.





PARISH OF CHRIST THE KING IN TOKOYO

The Situation of Children in Tokoyo

The Parish of Christ the King in Tokoyo is located in Bangassou, nestled within a Muslim neighborhood and surrounded by homes. It comprises over 13 chapels. While children in the city center can attend school thanks to public facilities, those in our chapels and villages lack almost everything. The cultural diversity of Tokoyo means many children struggle to receive a proper education. Some are even influenced by delinquent youths to become petty thieves in the neighborhoods or market. In the villages, children work in the fields every day because their parents prefer to use them as laborers. Many of these children lack moral and Christian values.







Support and Guidance Measures

To educate these children, who have strayed morally and educationally, the parish, with support from the Diocese angassou, has built a primary school, which

of Bangassou, has built a primary school, which provides quality education and training to numerous Muslim and Christian children.

Every day at the parish center, we offer catechism classes for baptism or confirmation. These numerous children are guided daily by two catechists. Additionally, every Saturday they participate in apostolate activities and attend the Basic Ecclesial Community (CEB) on Sundays. Through these activities, we teach the children to be Christians, which means to believe in God within the Church.

Moreover, the ACED movements, altar servers, and Children of Peace meet once a week on Saturday afternoons. The Children of Peace is a group we created to help and oversee young children, aged 3 to 6, who haven't yet attended catechism classes. They learn to make the sign of the cross, common prayers, God's commandments, and especially children's Bible stories. Every year, at Christmas, Epiphany, and Easter, they present biblical verses and songs inspired by the Word of God to the Church.

In the settlements around the chapels, we support village schools by providing educational materials and helping orphans. Catechism is also active and lively in our chapels; lessons are held twice a week, on Saturdays and Sundays. Almost all chapels have the ACE and Children of Peace movements to awaken the children to faith and community life.

At the beginning of each important liturgical season, we organize re-enactments on themes such as "Child, God Loves You" and "The Birth of Jesus."

Each year, before the Epiphany celebration, we gather all the children from the settlements around the chapels, and sometimes even those from other religious denominations, for events like peace marches, conferences on the role of children in the Church, games and competitions, concerts, and dances. These events always conclude with a grand Mass followed by a festive lunch. Over 150 children participate every year.

CATHEDRAL OF ST. PETER CLAVER IN BANGASSOU

The Situation of Children in Bangassou

The Cathedral of St. Peter Claver in Bangassou is located within the city and comprises over 7 chapels. It shares the Christian community of Bangassou with the Parish of Christ the King in Tokoyo. Besides its urban setting, every day we welcome many children who do not attend school, often left or abandoned by their parents. There are numerous cases of single mothers with multiple children. Given the context of NGOs, we also witness many cases of rape and sexual abuse of minors. Similarly, in the villages surrounding the chapels' settlements, many children are not attending school and are reduced to agricultural labor.

Support and Guidance Measures

To address the moral and educational needs of these vulnerable children, the parish operates a kindergarten and elementary school managed by the Sisters of the Congregation of St. Paul of Chartres, along with a high school overseen by the priests. Each weekday, children arrive in uniform to attend morning classes. Additionally, four times a week, children enrolled in catechism courses come to the parish in the afternoon, guided by parish catechists who prepare them for the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. We have also revitalized the ACE movements, altar servers, and dancers, who gather once a week. During these meetings, they read the Word of God, share insights, and learn songs and dances, all under the watchful eye of their leaders. Every year, during the Epiphany celebration, the parish organizes gatherings and outings to strengthen the children's faith, culminating in a festive meal for all orphaned children.

In the settlements surrounding the chapels, we support over 35 orphans, some of whom face challenging circumstances.

"MAMA TONGOLO" ORPHANAGE IN BANGASSOU

The Situation of Children

The "Mama Tongolo" orphanage, part of the Diocese of Bangassou, has been a refuge for vulnerable, abandoned, disadvantaged, and sometimes stigmatized children, whose parents were suspected of practicing witchcraft. There are orphans as young as seven months old (premature newborns) whose mothers died during childbirth, others aged one to three years, and older children ranging from three to eleven years, all victims of war. These children come from various backgrounds, many of them orphaned or displaced. Some have suffered due to rebel activities, while others were born to mothers facing mental health challenges. Besides the children residing at the Center, there are orphans placed in foster families, sometimes sent from distant locations when families realize they cannot provide adequate care.

Support and Guidance Measures

The "Mama Tongolo" center provides essential care, including shelter, food, clothing, and nurturing. Managed by three caregivers and a supervisor, under the guidance of Sister Yolande from the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres, the center ensures daily routines that cater to the children's educational and personal development needs.

School-age children attend kindergarten, elementary, or middle school classes. In the afternoons, they engage in domestic and culinary activities, learning skills such as palm oil, jam and soap production. They gather firewood for cooking, and in the evenings, three times a week, they gather for communal rosary recitations and spiritual study sessions. Every year, those who have not yet been baptized attend catechism classes at the Bangassou Cathedral and prepare to receive the sacraments of baptism and confirmation. They participate in all major diocesan events, including the diocesan pilgrimage and ordinations, to revive their faith and feel part of God's family. In October, they recite a daily missionary rosary to raise awareness about the hardships faced by others. During Christmas celebrations, they prepare meals and extend invitations to marginalized elders and prisoners, creating a compassionate and inclusive atmosphere.

As part of their community life, older siblings take on roles of responsibility, caring for younger ones. Finally, the orphanage provides vocational training; girls aged ten to twelve learn sewing, while boys are taught soap and palm oil production, aiming to make them responsible. Currently, the "Mama Tongolo" orphanage accommodates 35 orphans and provides care for over 250 children who have lost either a father or a mother. These children are placed in foster families.



ST. BERNARD'S PARISH IN GAMBO

The Situation of Children in Gambo

The Parish of St. Bernard in Gambo is situated within the municipality of Gambo and comprises several settlements around its chapels. One of the newest settlements, Pomboio, lies in a rebel-controlled area bordering the Diocese of Alindao. The proximity to this conflict zone has profoundly affected the children in these areas. Many have been displaced or orphaned, and there are prevalent issues of malnutrition and illiteracy. Families fleeing the war have lost everything—homes, fields and crops, beds and basic essentials. Some children lack birth certificates and have uncertain birth details. Daily life sees them either at home or toiling as laborers in the fields.



Support and Guidance Measures

Moved by the plight of these children, we have launched a pastoral program focused on revitalizing parish children's movements and supporting existing chapels. We've also refurbished our nursery and elementary schools. Our aim is to facilitate access to education for displaced families, ensuring children attend school regularly, learn, and experience a safe environment free from violence.

At the parish level, we conduct catechism meetings daily at various levels for baptism and confirmation, led by dedicated catechists. Once a week, children participate in activities within their groups—ACE (Action Catholic Education), altar servers, and dancers, while others have time to play together. These sessions include prayer, sharing of Gospel teachings, and spiritual formation.

Additionally, every quarter, we organize camps or outings to bring together children from three settlements/chapels and spend time with them, explaining the meaning of missionary faith and how to be missionaries. During these moments, we explore themes such as "God and His suffering," "Jesus and the children," and "The importance of children in the Church's mission." In addition, children animate the feast of Epiphany and the Day of the African Child every year. On Epiphany Day they recite Bible verses, while on the Day of the African Child, they walk around the town to raise awareness of children's rights.



ST. GEORGE PARISH OF OUANGO

The Situation of Children in Ouango
The Parish of St. George in Ouango is situated in the city of Ouango, which, much like Bema, lies on the border with the Democratic Republic of Congo. Being a border town, Ouango shares similar challenges and existential uncertainties. It's a densely populated sub-prefecture with many families having multiple children, struggling to provide them with the basic necessities for their natural development. As a result, many children are not enrolled in school, and some are left to fend for themselves, spending their days at home or engaged in activities like fishing. In rural villages around the chapels, educational opportunities are scarce due to

limited resources and lack of public infrastructure.

To support these children, the Parish of Ouango, with assistance from the Diocese, has established a primary school



with minimal fees, enabling many children to access quality education. The parish actively addresses the financial challenges parents face in educating their children. Each day, many enrolled children attend morning classes at the school.

At the parish center, catechism classes are held four times a week to prepare children for Baptism or Confirmation. he catechism sessions are led by dedicated catechists and lay volunteers.

Additionally, the ACE (Action Catholic Education) and Altar Servers movements meet once a week on Saturday afternoons. During these sessions, they read the Word of God, share Gospel teachings, and learn values such as respect, obedience, and service under the guidance of their leaders. They sometimes organize outings or biblical training camps outside the city, helping them fulfill their mission as disciples of Christ. These activities, which include participation from a priest and movement leaders, focus on themes such as "God is love," "The story of young Samuel," "Jesus and children," and "The importance of children in the church." These events also serve as moments of reflection.

To ensure we continue to educate the children in our settlements and chapels, we emphasize catechism teaching in all chapels. Catechists engage with catechumens two or three times a week and organize apostolic activities among the elderly.

Every year on Epiphany Day, we organize missionary events ranging from Bible verse recitation competitions to sessions promoting missionary faith. The day concludes with a festive meal honoring all children on the margins of society.





PARISH OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST IN ZEMIO

The Situation of Children in Zemio The Parish of St. John the Baptist in Zemio, one of our eastern parishes, is located in Zemio, besieged by armed groups for several years. Zemio is also close to Mboki, a city that has seen violent clashes among armed militias, making it a highly insecure area due to rebel presence. Despite these challenges, Zemio has provided refuge to many families with young children fleeing from destroyed villages, particularly those escaping from Mboki. Some of these displaced families find shelter within the parish. Additionally, five years ago, some residents of Zemio relocated to the village of Zapai in Congo, where they still reside, and their children cross the river daily to attend school. Therefore, we encounter cases of displaced children, traumatized children, and even victims of war, child soldiers, and abused children. Moreover, due to the distance from Bangui, the deteriorating state of roads, and the insecurity in the area, cases of malnutrition are still prevalent.

Support and Guidance Measures

To assist these children, the Parish, supported by the Diocese, has established both a primary and a secondary school. These institutions provide children with an ideal environment for education, learning, and moral development. From Monday to Friday, children arrive at school in their uniforms and stay until noon, including those who come from across

the Congo.

At the parish level, we have revitalized various movements to engage children. Twice a week, members of ACE (Aita Kwe) meet in the afternoon, along with their leaders. They learn practical skills such as setting up camps, traditional dances, and study sessions focused on the Word of God. Similarly, altar servers, scouts, and guides have designated meeting days to study their roles, organize weekly apostolic activities, and participate in charitable events. Every afternoon, catechism classes are held, where children learn about themselves and come to know Jesus, guided by dedicated catechists and priests.

In all our settlements and chapels, we provide catechetical instruction to prepare these children well for the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. Catechesis sessions are conducted twice a week, and apostolic activities are organized once a month. Some settlements and chapels also host children's movements such as ACE and altar servers, encouraging the children to serve God actively in the Church.

Considering the area's insecurity, we organize outings near the city twice a year. In late September and June, we spend time with the youth to educate them on good companionship and moral values. Additionally, we invite local elders to speak to the children about virtuous living.

Lastly, during Epiphany and African Children's Day, the children gather to prepare games and competitions to celebrate these occasions.



MALI ARCHDIOCESE OF BAMAKO




The situation of children in the Archdiocese of Bamako is quite diverse. Ecclesiastically, they are organized into Catholic action movements such as the Friends of Kizito, the Samuel groups, and the altar servers. On a family level, many children face challenges in practicing their faith due to various factors:

- Parents residing in other cities for work-related reasons.
- Mali is a predominantly Muslim country, making it more likely for children to interact with Muslim peers who might try to distance them from their faith, rather than with fellow Christian children.
- Many Christian children live in refugee camps due to the ongoing war and instability in the central and northern regions of the country.

MISSIONARY CHILDHOOD DAY

In the Diocese, Missionary Childhood Day is celebrated on the day of Epiphany. Each parish organizes its celebration. On that day, children actively participate in the Holy Mass, portraying the Three Wise Men, collecting offerings for the mission, and organizing games and fairs.

Each year, a diocesan festival is held during



the holidays for all children in the Diocese. It provides a space for the children for human, cultural, religious, and catechetical education. An entire week each year is dedicated to the Missionary Childhood celebration. During this week, the children come together to pray the rosary.

Training sessions are organized for the accompanying groups within the Friends of Kizito movement, the Samuel groups, and the groups of altar boys in the Archdiocese of Bamako. The aim is to coordinate and standardize the Missionary Childhood activities at the parish level.




